



# **GETTING IN BERLIN**

**By car:** Berlin is centrally located in Europe and can be reached quite easily from several European countries. Please notice that to travel by car in Berlin's city centre a vignette is required as you'd be travelling in an environmental zone, you can find more information on where to buy it <u>here</u>.



#### By train

Berlin's Hauptbahnof (central station) is located in the vibrant heart of the city.

To move from Berlin's Hauptbahnof, you can either:

• **Take a taxi**: there is a taxi waiting area in Europaplatz, right outside the station or you can call:

#### **Berlin's Airport**



Berlin's Airport, the **Willy Brandt Berlin Brandenburg airport** – **BER** is located in the south of the city, to reach the centre once you land, depending in which terminal you arrive, you have various options:

- by taxi: you can find taxis waiting outside of the city or you can pre-book the service before your arrival. More information on fees and pre-booking are available <u>here</u>.
- by train: you can catch the S-bahn line S9 or S45 that will allow you to reach the central station in 50 minutes, trains pass every 20 minutes. More information here.



• **by bus:** There are many express buses from the city's airport, more information on this webpage.

# Getting around the city

## By foot

Although Berlin's main landmarks may seem pretty close to each other the distances in the city are pretty high, just to give you an example, the distance between Alexanderplatz and the Brandenburg Gate is 2.5 km. This is to say that although not nearly impossible to walk through the city it could be tiring, and most importantly, pack some comfy shoes!

## By public transports

Berlin's pretty well connected and it can be very easy to move from one side of the city to the other just by using one of the many

options the city offers. Public transportation in Berlin comprises trams, buses, trains and the metro line. Despite its labyrinthine dimensions it's super easy to get used to moving around! You can find more information on the public transportation of Berlin in the official <u>webpage</u>.
