



GETTING IN BRUSSELS

By car

Brussels is located almost in the center of Belgium and can be easily reached from a lot of different countries. Please check this website for information on the restricted areas and parking spots.

By train

Thanks to its location, Brussels can be reached quite easily from a lot of different countries. The city's main train station is called "Brussels Central" and is where most train lines converge, however, it is not the only train station in the city. There are 4 other stations in the city and not all of them are connected to the same cities so check where you need to go to choose the right station. You can reach directly the city notably from:



Paris: 1 hour and a half ride;
Amsterdam: 2 hours ride.
London: 2 hours ride.

From "Brussels Central", you can reach on foot some of the most famous sights of the city. Other famous parts of Brussels can be a bit more complicated to reach so the best way is to check public transportation here.

By plane



There are two airports serving Brussels one is called "Brussels Airport" which is the nearest airport to the city center or "Brussels South Charleroi Airport" which is a bit further out from the city but still very well connected to it. Both airports can be reached in the following ways:

- **by taxi**: both airports have a taxi waiting area in front of their terminals. You can find more information on the official <u>website</u>. Fares and time depend on the airport and where you need to go.
- by bus: both airports can also be reached by bus. You can find more information for "Brussels Airport" here and for "Brussels South Charleroi Airport" here.
- **by train**: both airports are well connected to the city by trains. With the train, you can go from the airports to the three train stations in Brussels. More information is available on the official <u>website</u>.

Getting around the city



On foot

Brussels is a pretty big city with some monuments like the Atomium almost on the outskirts of the city. Our suggestion is to visit the historical center and some of the neighborhoods on foot but then to take public transport to move from one side to another of the city!

By public transport

There are several options to go around Brussels because the city is well connected by several metro, bus, and tram lines. The more efficient way is of course the metro but buses and trams are a good solution if you want to admire the city while going around it. By bike
